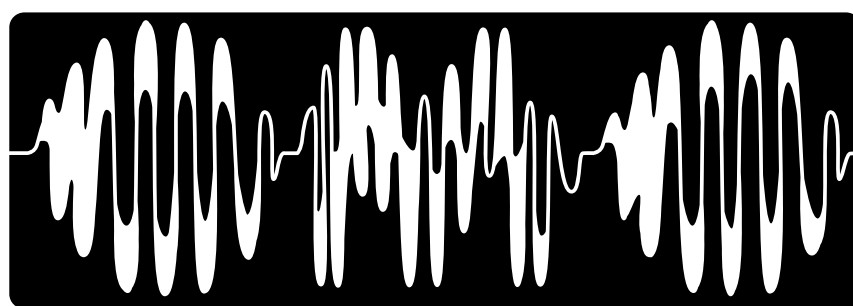

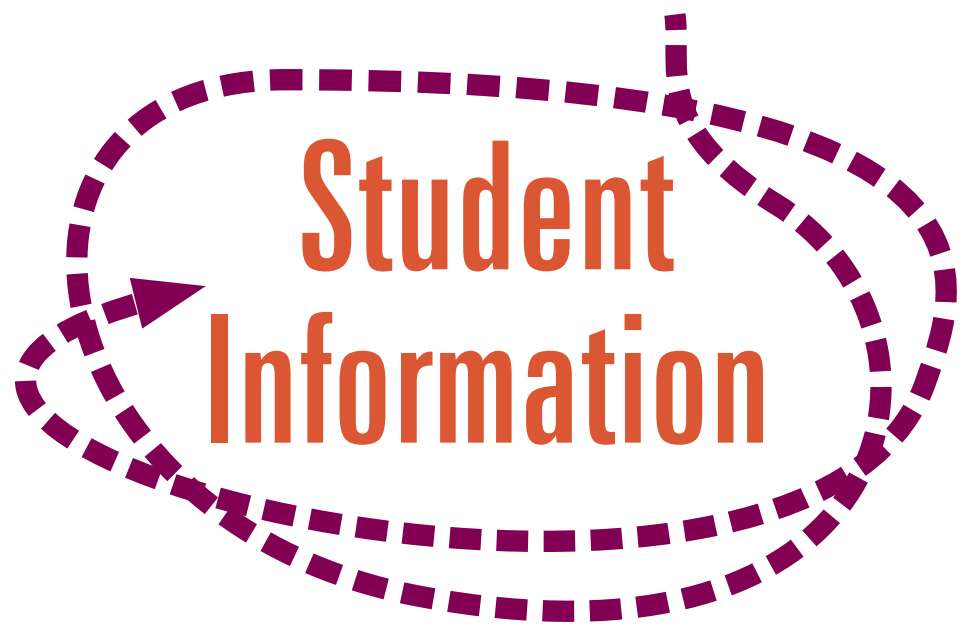

To register for a credit course:

If you are a new student or you have not taken a class in the past ten months, you will need to complete and provide:

1) Application for Admission. If you are paying in-district or in-state tuition, you will be required to provide your Colorado Driver's license number and your Colorado license plate number.

2) Registration Form. Both the Application for Admission and the Registration Form can be found online or at the registration desk.

3) Proof of lawful presence. More information about this requirement can be found in the Colorado Mountain College 2011-2012 Catalog. The required Affidavit Form is available at the registration desk.

4) Transcripts or placement test scores for courses requiring a prerequisite.

5) Payment, or proof of financial aid, scholarships, or your enrollment in the FACTS/Nelnet payment plan. Colorado Mountain College accepts cash, check, Visa, MasterCard and Discover.

Non-Credit Registration

To sign up for a course designated as "non-credit," you need only to fill out the **Registration Form**, available at our office, and submit your payment. You can also register online at **WebAdvisor.ColoradoMtn.edu** by clicking on the *Continuing Education* tab.

If you meet additional requirements, you may also be able to register **online**. If you are a new student or have not taken a class in the last ten months, please **walk in**, **fax in** or **mail in** all required forms and payment to any Colorado Mountain College location.
