GED Preparation Classes:

GED Preparation and Active Learning Skills class students are charged a fee to attend these classes. Fees range from \$30 to \$60, based on the length of the class.

BEFORE registering for the GED Prep or Active Learning Skills classes, ALL students must meet with Learning Lab staff to discuss their options and register. Students who want to attend the spring semester MUST complete an intake meeting the week of January 9-13. Classes start Monday, January 16.

New Students - Orientation for the GED Prep program is the week of January 9-13. Make an appointment with Learning Lab staff to complete paperwork and take an initial test. Please call 625-6923 or 625-6925 to make an appointment during the week of January 9.

Returning Students - Please call 625-6923 or 625-6925 to make an appointment with Learning Lab staff to discuss your enrollment options during the week of January 9.

Active Learning Skills (Brush-up) Students - Students who have their high school diploma, have taken the Accuplacer test and placed at or below the 030 course level can register for Active Learning Skills classes through the Learning Lab. The fee is \$30 for these classes.

Classes starting in February: Week of Feb. 6

Classes starting in March: Week of Feb. 27 (No classes starting in April or May)

GED TEST: The official GED test is offered at the Rifle campus on the first Saturday of each month. Pre-registration is required. Registration and payment for tests must be completed one week before the test date. The cost for each test is \$30. There are (5) GED tests - \$150 for all 5 tests. Contact 625-6923 or 625-6925.
